
## Traffic In Kathmandu








There are 17,842 registered busses in the Kathmandu Valley.

There are 489,686 registered motorcycles.







There are 7,353 registered temps (three wheelers) .





There are 93,266 registered cars.




Safe and affordable means of transportation need to be made readily available to the middle and lower class.
